


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A Word from the Board

A Successful First Year

In November 2022, we announced our full registration and recognition in the U.S., enabling us to expand our reach even further.




Working to Help the Elderly

Our Future Researcher



Branham Kock MSc. Chemistry (UWC)

Branham's research is aimed at the fabrication of a low-cost, sensitive, and accurate immunosensor capable of detecting SARS-Cov-2-specific antibodies as an early detection system for COVID-19, and possibly other diseases, particularly in underdeveloped regions.

During his master's degree, he has already published his first review paper and presented his work at a national chemistry conference. At the start of this year, he also had the incredible opportunity to spend two months in France working alongside researchers at Cergy Paris University (CYU). This collaboration allowed him to deepen his understanding of various scientific techniques and methodologies related to his project.


More than increasing my earning potential, I'm growing even more as an individual and broadening my horizon: these are priceless experiences!"





Financials


